

The purpose of this policy is to ensure all conflict of interest forms are received a minimum of 3 business days prior to an education event — including Regularly Scheduled Series. What is the importance of this policy? Disclosures of financial conflicts of interest to learners is required for all speakers and planners to eliminate the



members, moderators, faculty, or others involved in the education.

What is considered a financial conflict of interest? An individual is said to have a financial conflict of interest if they are receiving any money (e.g. royalties, consulting fees) from an ineligible company. To find a full list of ineligible companies, please see page 4 of the Standards of Integrity and Independence in Accredited Continuing Education.

potential for real or perceived bias from industry funding. This policy helps us ensure that all conflicts of interest are mitigated prior to the educational event.

Who does this policy apply to? The policy applies to anyone in control of content for an activity, including all course directors, planning committee

Why do we need 3 business days? If a relevant financial relationship is identified, the individual with the conflict must work with IPCE Department's Accredited Education Coordinator, Medical Director, and Accredited Provider Program Director to mitigate this prior to the event and adhere to all accreditation requirements. The 3-day policy helps to ensure that we have ample time to resolve these conflicts so that credit can be awarded.




from Banff, Canada to Quebec which sounds magical.

My series wants nursing credit (ANCC), what next? If you have an existing regularly scheduled series (RSS) or you are wanting to start up a new RSS with nursing credit, there are some things that you need to consider. Some questions to

Will we have RNs or ARPNs as part of our target audience?

This is a very important distinction to make and ask your planning committee. Typically, Advanced Practice Registered

How many RNs would regularly attend this event? It is important to ensure that you will have enough RNs to make applying for the credit worth it. If you routinely only have 1 RN attend, applying for the credit would not

be worth the work involved. You will work with IPCE to determine the exact numbers you need in your series

Is the content of this series applicable to RNs?

Nurses (APRNs) will align with physicians and want AMA (physician) credit and not nursing contact hours. If APRNs are part of your target audience and not

ask yourself and your planning committee include:

When considering adding ANCC credit to your series, you need to determine if the content is applicable to the RNs. If your series is about diagnosing patients, this would be out of scope for the RNs so you may not want to pursue nursing credit. Adding nursing credit should never be an afterthought and be done just to include them. Education for the team needs to be applicable to all members of the team.

they will decide if the IPCE team has the bandwidth to award nursing credit to your series.

The answers to all these questions will help you decide if nursing credit is appropriate for your series. If you feel like nursing credit is appropriate your next step is to complete an IPCE intake request. A member of the IPCE team will interview you and learn all the details about your request. This request will go to the IPCE Education Review Council and

license in the state of Utah. The nurse planner will be accountable for ensuring all nursing accreditation requirements are met for each session. This includes the nursing application, the paperwork that is required before each session and the end of year nursing paperwork. *Note – this paperwork is different than what is required for each session that the RSS coordinator manages for the series. The identified nurse will work closely with Lindsay Tatton (ANCC Accredited Provider Program Director) to learn the ANCC requirements and required paperwork. One the initial application is done and approved, your series can then start offering nursing contact hours!



The IPCE department submits an annual report called NARS (Nursing Activity Reporting System) detailing the total attendance and credit hours of activities that offered nursing contact hours. ACPE -The ACPE accredits organizations that provide continuing pharmacy education (CPE) for *pharmacists* and *pharmacy* <u>technicians</u>. The IPCE department is required to submit the credit awarded to attendees to CPE Monitor (an electronic system for pharmacists and pharmacy technicians to track their continuing education credits) within 60 days of an activity's conclusion.

We also require that there be active learning which is typically a post-test after the activity is completed. Participants will also be required to complete an evaluation to get credit for the enduring material. Once the enduring material activity has been approved by IPCE, it will be made available on the IPCE Department CloudCME website: https://intermountain.cloud-cme.com/default.aspx under the Online Courses tab. The credit hours offered will be determined by the activity offered. Those who complete the activity by viewing the materials, completing the post-test and survey will be awarded the number of credits designated for the activity. The cost for participants will vary depending on the activity and number of credits offered. The biggest difference between live and enduring activities is the flexibility of when the participant can choose to complete the

process. The presenter must fill out the form each time they speak, within 2 weeks, in order to receive the credit and physicians/presenters can never claim credit for their own presentation. We do not award credit for teaching at events not accredited by Intermountain Healthcare. If a presentation is "team taught" we trust they will claim the appropriate amount of credit representing their contribution. For example, if three presenters work together to create a one-hour presentation, with each presenter speaking for 20 minutes, each presenter could appropriately claim the full amount for teaching one hour, each having worked together to prepare and team-teach the one-hour presentation. In contrast, if 4 presenters independently prepare and present 30-minute case presentations for a total of 2 hours, each one would more appropriately claim the amount for only their 30-minute contribution.
